#### SUMMARY

This report is for information only and provides a summary of the Executive Officer's recent activities as well as other miscellaneous items relevant to the Commission.

### March 11 Workshop

Staff continues planning activities related to the scheduled special meeting on March 11, 2019, for purposes of conducting a public workshop. The workshop will be separated into two distinct topics: (1) an educational "LAFCO 101" presentation by staff and (2) a robust discussion with interested stakeholders relating to the draft Policy on Spheres of Influence prepared by the Policy Committee. A draft flyer advertising the workshop is included as Attachment One. Feedback is welcome prior to staff circulating the flyer to all local agencies and other interested stakeholders following today's meeting.

### New Analyst

Staff recently hired Dawn Mittleman Longoria as the Commission's Analyst II. Ms. Longoria's first day in the office was Tuesday, January 15, 2019. Ms. Longoria's experience includes serving as Executive Officer for Marin LAFCO, Commissioner for Sonoma LAFCO (special district representative), and Legislative Committee Chair for CALAFCO. Among other immediate contributions, Ms. Longoria will substantially assist with the "LAFCO 101" presentation at the above-referenced workshop on March 11.

### CALAFCO Annual Staff Workshop

The Executive Officer has been recruited to participate as a panel speaker for two educational sessions at the 2019 CALAFCO Staff Workshop scheduled for April 10 through April 12 in San Jose. The session topics relate to LAFCO Analyst development and staff transition planning.



# Why are there LAFCOs? Attachment One

### Governor Edmund G. Brown's Good Idea...

- Governor declares need for a statewide growth management plan in California after taking office in 1959
  - Population grew by 1,430 daily with 65 cities and 300 special districts created in the 1950's
  - Unknown amount of agricultural land lost; State did not begin tracking land use changes until 1960
- Legislature agrees and creates Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCOs) in 57 counties in 1963
  - LAFCOs were delegated authority to regulate city and special district boundaries going forward
  - San Francisco LAFCO was created in 2000; all 58 California counties now have a LAFCO

### What are LAFCOs' Directives and Powers?

# The Legislature's Expectations for LAFCOs...

- Discourage urban sprawl
- Prevent premature conversion of agricultural and open space lands
- Encourage logical and orderly land uses relative to local conditions and circumstances
- Prepare studies to facilitate efficient and sustainable municipal growth and development

# LAFCO's Regulatory and Planning Powers...

- Approve city and special district boundary changes (establishment, expansion, reduction)
- Authorize requests from cities and special districts to provide municipal services outside their boundaries
  - Typically to mitigate or prevent threats to public health and safety
- Establish and update spheres of influence for all cities and special districts
  - All boundary changes and outside service extensions must be consistent with the agency's sphere
- Prepare municipal reviews to independently evaluate the adequacy of governmental services

### Who Makes Decisions on LAFCOs?

# LAFCOs' Decision-Makers are Mostly Local Officials...

- Most LAFCOs comprise eight members (five regular voting members and three alternates)
  - County Supervisors; City Councilmembers; and appointed public members
- LAFCO members represent the interests of the entire county; not only their "home agency"
- Decisions are final; no outside appeal process with the exception of a standard reconsideration period
